## Work Cited (use page R15 in Purple Book)

All items are alphabetized by first word in entry, which could be the author's or editor's last name, the name of the Webpage article, the name of the book if there is no author or editor, etc.

All items are indented after the first line.

All items are correctly capitalized

Titles of book underlined or in italics

All items use the correct punctuation (USE THE R15 PAGE!)

If typed, everything is doublespaced. If handwritten, skip lines between entries.

Part of my family history and heritage through my mother's side of the family has its roots deep in Delaware. Family documents and genealogy searches done by different family members trace the Ward family, my Mom's maiden name, back to the 1600's in Delaware. The family came from England before that. The Wards I remember and knew personally were my great-grandparents, Charles and Dora. Charles, who came from a farm in Delaware moved to Philadelphia with his wife, Dora, became a streetcar operator. They had three children, Calvin, Paul and Florence; and Dora also worked for a time at a shirt factory in Philadelphia. In retirement, when I knew them, they lived on a streetcar route in West Philadelphia. My great-grandfather, who suffered from Parkinson's disease, would sit on his enclosed front porch and watch the streetcars on the route. My great-grandmother was not a particularly affectionate person, but she always had frosted store cookies in the jar on the kitchen counter and a container of large glass marbles kept on the TV that we were allowed to play with on the living room floor.

Their son, Paul, was my grandfather, my mother's dad. He married a girl from Delaware, Volta Long, and settled in suburban Philadelphia, but they maintained a large garden out of the city and farmed vegetables. Paul drove a bus for the Red Arrow company, and he and Volta had four children: Pauline Jeannette, my mom, Otis, Doris and Vivian. They had a small row house on Sunshine road in Upper Darby which I remember as being filled with smoke and people. Two of my aunts lived there with their children (my cousins) during much of my childhood. We would go to the house for Sunday mid day dinner sometimes, and the table was bursting with people. My Aunt Doris died when I was a teenager, and my Uncle Ottie died just this past Christmas.

My mother, Pauline Jeannette their oldest daughter, spent most of her life in the Southwestern Philadelphia suburbs. She spent summers throughout her childhood with her Long grandparents in Delaware, which was not unusual in those Depression times. Families working in the cities would send their children to the country relatives in the summer where they could both get fresh air, eat the fresh grown produce and help on the farms a bit as well. She did well in school, graduated from Upper Darby high school, and worked for Philadelphia Electric Company as a secretary/clerk before meeting my father and marrying at age 19.

### I Family History of the Ward Family - my mom's side

#### A. Family traces back to 1600's in Delaware, before that in England

Charles - Great Grandfather m. Dora Long

Moved from Delaware farm to Philadelphia Pa

Charles worked for Philadelphia Transit, conductor for street car in the city

Dora, mother of three children, also worked in shirt factory

Calvin, Paul, Florence were children

Lived in West Philadelphia

Remember the jar of cookies in the kitchen and glass marbles on the TV

Paul Ward m. Volta Long, my grandparents

Volta was a farm girl from Delaware

Paul worked for Red Arrow Transit in suburban Philadelphia, drove a bus

Paul and Volta farmed several acres out of town for vegetables

Had four children: Pauline Jeannette, Otis, Doris, Vivian

Three of their grandchildren (my cousins) lived with them for years on Sunshine Road in Upper Darby, Pa.

Went to house for Sunday mid day dinner sometimes.
