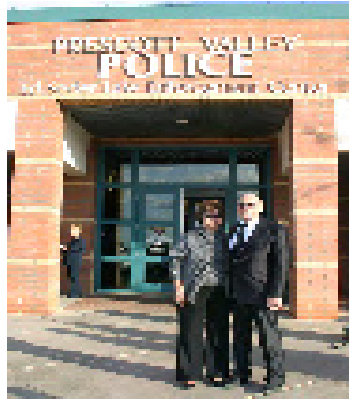


## Police Station Named for Huron Grad

Huron graduate Ed Seder, '59, recently had a police station and its new addition named after him, in a tribute to his sixteen years of dedicated service to his community. Ed's community is entirely different from where he grew up in Huron. First, it's surrounded by mountains, in the middle of cacti and circling buzzards, in a town without even a single paved road when he first arrived, almost two thousand miles away from Lake Erie, in a state redder than its famed rocks, Arizona, in a town called Prescott Valley, which did not even exist when Ed attended Huron High. Today it is billed as the fastest growing community in Arizona.

Ed went to Prescott Valley, not to be confused with Prescott nor Chino Valley, from Apache Junction back in the days when everything was pretty much dust and sagebrush, and For Sale signs marred the arid landscape. The police force consisted of five members but then Sun Belters from the North and Empty Nesters started flocking to the area to escape the rigors of Northern winters. Realtors purchased Lonesome Valley (not Dove) about ten miles east of Prescott, changed the name, scared off the jackalopes and mountain lions, pounded down the signs, and the rest, as they say, is history. Ed presided over a municipal expansion that saw the area increase in size from 2,500 dusty souls to close to 40,000 estimated today, just one generation later. Sixteen years and then a force of 44 officers later, Ed retired in 2000, leaving the department in good hands with a host of programs that still benefit the community today.

Examples of the far reaching effect Ed had on the area are several programs instituted under his aegis and continuing – The Northern Arizona Regional Training Academy, the Volunteers in Police Service, and the Prescott Valley Police Citizen's

Academy. Not one to rest on his laurels, Ed continues to serve the community-at-large by serving as Coordinator of the Administration of Justice Studies Program at Yavapai College.

Said Town Attorney Ivan Legler, "It was a challenging period that Ed oversaw. Seeing the job he did as police chief and the work he is doing now to teach the young recruits to be good and caring police officers, Ed has definitely left his mark on this town." Moreover, while chief, Ed served the community other ways as well. He served with the Kiwanis, was president of the Arizona Chiefs of Police, served on the Boys and Girls Club Board, the Special Olympics Torch Run, the Steering Committee of the PV Samaritan Village, the Chamber of Commerce Board, the town council, and as Deacon at PV's First Baptist Church. Ed also won a coveted Freedom of Information award from the Arizona Newspapers Association for his policy of open cooperation with the news media. And he didn't even have to house his inmates in desert tents nor make them wear pink underwear! That's not Ed's style.

As one Councilman stated before

the vote making the naming official, naming of a building for someone should be "inspirational. If we name a building after Ed Seder, it would certainly be appropriate." Ed was lauded as constantly contributing to his community and for creating a "caring police department," words one hardly places together regularly in the same sentence, but, no doubt, words describing the result of Ed's roots in a small, caring community like Huron.

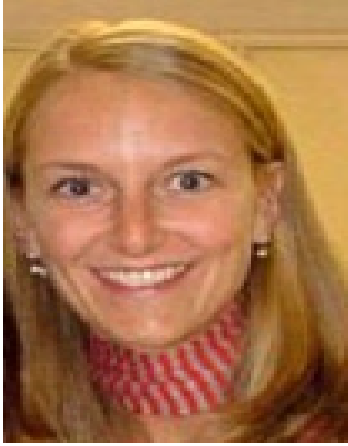

## Shawnee School Reopens with Alumna as Principal

And the wheel comes full circle. We congratulate Tanny Vonthron, '92, upon her recent appointment as principal of Shawnee School. The daughter of Carl Vonthron, '67, Tanny began her education career in the very Shawnee building as a four-year old in kindergarten under the tutelage of Mrs. Kelly back in 1979. In high school Tanny was active in all sorts of activities, probably the most memorable being her senior year as a member of the tennis team that won the SBC for the third year in a row and went to state. (She claims she still hits a pretty mean backhand.) After her graduation from Huron High, she attended Ohio University for a year before transferring to BGSU where she earned her Bachelor of Science in Special Education in 1997. She





also received her teaching license in Education of the Handicapped at that time.

Tanny then taught for the Archbold (OH) schools as an intervention specialist in grades K through 5 until she came to Huron in August of 2001. Here she worked with our first through fourth graders, before moving to Charlotte NC from 2002 until 2004 where she worked for a book publisher. During that same time she had five of her own children's books published and other educational resource materials. Three of her books were based upon the popular PBS character and show called *Caillou*. If you have preschoolers, then you know Caillou and his family.

Tanny turned in her Southern accent and returned to Huron in August of 2004 where she has served as intervention specialist at the high school level for the past four years. That meant that she worked with special needs students and their teachers to make sure the student IEP's were being met and that classroom teachers were assisted in adapting and modifying lessons for the special needs students.

So what did she do in her free time? Professionally, Tanny earned her M. Ed. Degree from BGSU in Educational Administration and Supervision in August of 2001. Then she plugged ahead with more licenses, and not fishing ones either. She worked on

her Elementary Principal Licensure and completed that work in July of 2002, with a renewal in 2006. Next she completed her Superintendent Licensure work in July of 2005 from the University of Findlay (OH). For kicks and giggles, since 2005 she has served as Faculty Manager for the athletic department. As such she has been responsible for more than putting up the volleyball nets. Duties included providing for the needs of all officials (very important as home team manager to see that refs are treated most royally!) overseeing ticket sales and concessions, and in general acting as goodwill ambassador for the Huron Schools as visitors used our facilities for athletic contests. She also served on the local Professional Development Committees, was a building representative for the high school faculty, and assisted as teacher mentor for two years. Finally, as National Honor Society advisor, she personally presided at the semi-annual bloodletting ceremonies, aka, the American Red Cross Blood Drives. On her watch, many fainted, but none was lost!

So all in all, Tanny has been well prepared for the task before her. There are no shoes to step into, as Shawnee School has not had a principal since it closed to Huron's students in 1982. Since that time the building has served special needs students of Erie County and also as home for the Montessori School. During the summer, classrooms are also used as "dormitory" space for the Bowling Green students participating in the Huron Summer Playhouse experience. A separate wing also contains the Board of Education offices.

This summer the preparations will be made to re-house our own Huron students once again. That will include successfully moving out the present occupants and then seeing that all the equipment and educational materials necessary for preschool through second grade students find their way across town into the proper rooms

and are reunited with the proper teachers, all before the doors open in late August. It's quite a task for a seasoned principal, let alone a brand new one, but knowing Tanny and her work ethic, barring any slow drying paint, the building will be ready with teachers standing by their doors to greet the fresh scrubbed faces of their charges.

Says Tanny of her upcoming challenge: "I am extremely excited to start the next phase of my professional educational career as a principal where it started twenty-nine years ago as a kindergarten student at Shawnee Elementary School. Who would have guessed that the four year old in pigtails who walked from her Elwood Heights home to Mrs. Kelly's morning kindergarten class would one day be principal? Certainly not me! Many thanks to all who have helped me along the way!"

We wish Tanny and her staff luck as they begin another chapter in the history of Shawnee School. The wheel keeps turning, and the building keeps churning out students well prepared to meet the challenges of tomorrow. May it continue to be so!

## Lyle Rowe Retires

Almost two thousand of you began your academic careers at Woodlands Elementary School by walking through those formidable front doors on your first day of kindergarten and running the gauntlet of teachers, "big kids," and a smiling principal, Mr. Lyle Rowe. Most of you never had to pay a visit to his office. Just your luck, for you missed a chance to personally meet with a soft spoken yet firm educator instead of encountering the "board of education." For eighteen years Lyle ran his building with a family atmosphere and was much admired by his staff and the students as well.

Before arriving at Huron in 1990, Lyle had taught for 15 years in San-

dusky at the 4th – 6th levels and then served two years as an elementary principal in Fremont. Their loss was our gain. In 1995 he was named the Chamber of Commerce’s Educator of the Year and then in 1998 won the Jaycees Boss of the Year award. A great booster of reading, he encouraged the students during Right to Read Week with zany rewards like winning a chance to throw a pie in his face (how’d that whipped cream taste, Lyle?) to taping him to a wall. (Luckily the janitor spotted him on the way out!) And there wasn’t a lot of shade either the year he spent a day in a rocker on the school rooftop, rocking and reading for all the students to see. Some say he was actu-

ally off his rocker, but “anything for kids” was his motto. As one youngster said, upon hearing of Lyle’s retirement, “He can’t go. He’s the father of our building!” That about says it all. Lyle leaves revered by staff and kids alike.

Now he gets to spend more time with his own pair of grandkids, and after a short hiatus, will return to the schools as EMIS Director. Someone has to punch in all those numbers the State wants these days. Well done, Lyle, and don’t forget to take a stroll down Memory Lane through Woodlands’ halls a time or two. ## Huron Schools to Reorganize

Ever since the early 1980’s Huron has been a three-building system. Shawnee School on the east side had been mothballed for our students when the big population boom of the 60’s and 70’s had passed like a pig through a python. The facilities have been leased over the years as a county-wide base for the Montessori School and for classes for exceptional children from the Erie County system. One wing houses our Board of Education offices and store rooms, and during many a hot summer, classroom windows have blossomed with air conditioners as parts of the building even became dorm space for Bowling Green’s budding thespians performing for the Huron Playhouse. Much of that will end now as over this summer buildings are reshuffled and refitted to make way for a reorganization and better use of our facilities.

The plain simple matter is that the McCormick Middle School has become somewhat of an albatross on the system. Built during WWII, and then expanded with the addition of an annex in the early ‘50’s, the facility has been financially draining the district as it tries to maintain the roofs, outdated boilers, and inefficient heating systems, upgrade the electrical system to accommodate ever changing educational needs,

and deal with inefficiencies of drafty doors and windows in an era of rising energy costs. So what to do?

The plan calls for retaining only the middle school seventh and eighth grades at McCormick and evicting all others. The fourth through sixth graders will now be housed at Woodlands, and the preschool through third grades will once again fill Shawnee School. The old annex will house the Montessori students, while the Erie County students will take up new digs in a more centrally located facility over in the Margareta district. Only the high school remains unaffected by the moves. Everyone benefits, though some disgruntled sixth graders are dismayed at the prospects of having to return to Woodlands for a year after having “graduated” from that building. They’ll get over it!

In the meantime, staff and administrators will be busy this summer preparing for and making the moves. Current Middle School principal Mark Doughty will move with part of his present staff to the Woodlands building to replace the retiring Lyle Rowe, while the current assistant principal there, Chad Carter, will remain as building leader at McCormick. Shawnee School then reopens

with a new principal in the person of Tanny Vonthron, a 1992 Huron High alumna, with much of the staff coming over from the present Woodlands. The Board of Education offices will remain at Shawnee.

The beauty of this new utilization plan is that it will stave off any need for a future levy or bond issue to add on to the existing buildings. Unless there is a huge influx of folks into the community or something gets into the water and the per capita household level suddenly increases, Huron should not have to place another building tax issue before the voters for quite some number of years.

So if you happen to be in town this summer and see loads of equipment and chairs trucking up and down Cleveland Road east to west and all points in between, don’t be surprised if you hear music coming from the chairs in those trucks. It all sounds so complicated, but planning has been going on for months to make all the necessary transitions smoothly and have the students in the right seats in the right rooms in the right buildings by late August. And after all the kinks have been worked out by late September, everyone will wonder why this hadn’t been done sooner. Best of luck on a great move.

# Chris McGraw Wounded in Iraq

On January 15th, Huron High School graduate Chris McGraw, '96, was serving as part of a patrol in Northern Iraq when his unit was ambushed and suffered heavy casualties. Chris alone survived from a five-man team though severely wounded in the left shoulder and right arm from bullets and pieces of shrapnel.

His parents, Katy Kaiser McGraw, '76 and Brian McGraw, '74, were soon notified that Chris had been treated and evacuated to a medical facility in Germany. While preparing to fly over to see him, they were notified that his wounds, though serious, did not prevent his being sent back to the States within a few days to his home base in Fort Campbell KY. His brother Kevin, '03 and parents were able to visit him there and bring the support of family and community to his healing process. He was set to recoup there off base at the home of a friend until further surgery required his being moved to Augusta GA where there were better facilities

for treating the type of wound and nerve damage suffered in his right arm. Doctors seemed optimistic that Chris could regain most of his motor control in the left arm, but time and therapy will determine how well his right arm respond to treatment.

Even more painful than the physical suffering was the loss of part of Chris's military family in the attack. A bond of brotherhood develops among military comrades-in-arms that lasts a life time. Unfortunately, in incidents such as this the loss of comrades is felt even more deeply than loss of one's own limb, so healing will definitely be required on two fronts. Chris's military service dates back to his first enlistment in 1998. He did his basic training at Fort Benning, GA and was then stationed at Fort Lewis, WA for sniper training. Chris then moved to Fort Campbell, KY where he had been serving with the 101st Airborne Division since 2003. Chris's first tour to Iraq serving as a sniper began soon after his arrival at Fort Campbell.

A second time, in 2005, he was called back to service and again departed for Iraq. This time he served as the sniper platoon leader. When that term was up, Chris was called back yet again to help finish the job. He shipped out in September, 2007, and at the time of the attack was serving as a scout team leader. The turnout was tremendous and the crowd was able to meet and speak with Chris as he ambled among the tables and received the well-wishes of former classmates, school day chums, friends, and neighbors. His spirits were very good and obviously uplifted by the turnout.

After a home stay, Chris returned to his home base for evaluation for further treatment. Surgeries to date have been relatively successful, and all are hoping for continued good progress. Further updates will be reported upon here.

## Tearing Up a Field

Most sports writers use the term “tearing up the field” to describe some hot-shot running back having a terrific, once in a lifetime game, with turf flying with every cut and plunge. Around Huron this summer the term is used more literally. Three days into summer break, dozers, graders, loaders, and trucks assaulted the football field and literally began tearing it up to prepare for laying a new synthetic surface. But not before some sentimental Boosters and H-Team members over the weekend had carefully removed slices of sod to carry home and replant on sacred sites in backyards all across Huron. Such devotion to Huron’s football legacy! It’s the latest religion come to town.

Barnes Nursery supplied most of the equipment, men, and muscle to make mincemeat of the field in one day. Monday, June 2 saw huge, earth devouring machines fired up promptly at 7 AM. As neighbors awoke to the sound, the earth moving equipment began turning over the entire sod surface, dozed it all onto huge piles, and prepared it for loading. June 3 began a tad damp as showers had moved in over night, but by day’s end most of the dirt had been hauled out by a constant procession of green Barnes trucks. June 4 saw that part of the job completed, with the surface lowered the proper amount and compacted for a good base to be spread and proper drainage installed. June 5 saw work begin on digging a two-foot wide footer set three feet deep, this in order to have an anchor onto which the carpet would be stretched.

At the same time work was progressing on the former concession stand, turning that into a remodeled ticket booth. The ticket booth on the north side of the field nearest the visitors’ stands had also been completely removed and the site prepared for rebuilding a booth to match the west side entrance. Cruelly now a cat dozes the remaining sod, as somewhere sweetly o’er the saddened shores sound the plaintiff tones of *Taps*.





**A huge grader mercilessly drove its way up and down the length of the field, tearing up the sod and laying it back into wind-rows. A dozer then pushed these former lines of scrimmage back, waaay back, till the center of the field was piled high with rolls of sod, strewn about like sophomore tackling dummies after a senior scrimmage, awaiting their final disposal.**

**With glacial force and speed, the field gradually disappeared under the unrelenting onslaught of cats and loaders. This sacred piece of land, so sanctified by blood of heroes past, held on fast until at last it gave up the ghost.**
